

RE: Proposed Maximum Annual Yield for the Arbuckle Simpson Groundwater Basin

Dear Members of the Board and Mr. Strong,

My wife Julie and I are landowners to the extent of 2,800 acres east of Sulphur, OK, which lands are subject to the above captioned proposal.

There are several gross inequities within the proposal as they relate not only to myself and fellow landowners but also to the Murray County Rural Water District No. 1, whose wells are located immediately across the road from my property. Additionally the City of Sulphur has wells from which they take approximately 1.4 million gallons per day, even though they have no water rights save for just a few acres. Both of the aforementioned entity's wells are easily within two miles of Buffalo and Antelope Springs in the Chickasaw National Recreation Area.

The Murray County Rural Water District No. 1 has actively sought additional water rights from myself and other landowners. They have been held hostage, as have I, waiting on a maximum annual yield determination from the OWRB, for approximately eight (8) years. To impose a 20 year phased in 0.2 acre feet equal proportionate share on myself or the water district is, putting it mildly, like a swift kick in the face.

We and many other landowners strongly feel that a MAY any less than the recharge of the aquifer is simply theft of our water rights. Because we have had scant notice of this proposed action order I strongly urge you to reconsider the entire matter as it affects the local water district. Anything less is a travesty to my rights as a landowner and the future water supply of the Murray County Rural Water District No. 1.
